

Recreation Division Highlights

Pumpkin Painting:

Parks & Recreation hosted the 22nd Annual Schilter Farm Family Pumpkin Painting event on Thursday, October 17, at Tumwater Middle School.

Over 235 community members attended. Pumpkins were painted, kettle corn was eaten, and fun was had by all. Our sincere appreciation goes out to Schilter Family Farm for donating all of the pumpkins and to our sponsors Eric Zabala State Farm Agency, and WSECU, for helping to make this a free family event for our community.







Tumwater Youth Program:

The Tumwater Youth Program (TYP) is off to a great start! We have offered two events this school year, with 400 grade school students and 300 middle school students attending. Activities included inflatable obstacle courses, pumpkin decorating, costume contests, dancing, face painting, sports, crafts, and much more! 45 volunteers assisted supervising students and running games at the two events. Since September, 15 new volunteers have completed the orientation process and are ready to begin assisting at future TYP events. TYP will offer 22 events this school year for our community's youth, grades 2-12.

Recreational and Competitive Basketball Leagues:

The Tumwater Basketball began practices in October. Between the recreational and competitive leagues, this season of Tumwater Basketball will include 96 teams and nearly 1000 youth players. It's the biggest league in Thurston County - and one of the largest in western Washington! Over 200 volunteer coaches make this program possible and will contribute over 7,000 volunteer hours this season.

Clean-up, Drop-off Stats:

We held the annual Clean-up, Drop-off event at City Hall on Saturday, October 5. This year's stats are pretty impressive!

- Over 4.23 tons of paper shredded
- 8 medication lock boxes distributed

- 125 pounds of prescription medication collected
- 1,435 pounds of food and \$328 donated to the Thurston County Food Bank



Union Pioneer Calvary Cemetery Talking Headstones Tour & Cemetery Dedication:

The Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution approached the City earlier this year with the goal of cleaning, restoring, and leveling all the headstones in the Union Pioneer Calvary Cemetery. The group dedicated over 500 hours to this project and just finished in September. To celebrate their work and to honor the cemetery, Parks & Recreation held a dedication ceremony on Saturday, October 19. Close to 200 people attended the ceremony and participated in the Talking Headstone Tour. Participants included Mayor Debbie Sullivan, Parks & Recreation Commissioners, State officials, and descendants of the Bush family and Rutledge family.






Facilities Division Highlights

In preparation for putting up our usual holiday display, staff realized that it was time to replace



some pretty old lights. Staff are starting to assemble over a MILE of Christmas lights that will go up on City Hall and Old Town Center, at the golf course, and of course on Tumwater's own Christmas tree.

The smaller play structure for 2 - 5 year olds at Historical Park will be closed for approximately one week, starting Monday October 21, while staff work to repair and upgrade the glider play toy. This toy is a special one as it allows for wheelchair access and helps make this playground more accessible to children of all abilities.
